*Project Tomorrow Recognized the 2012 Speak Up 200: Schools and Districts  
Who Are Empowering Students, Teachers and Parents in Decision-Making*

(September 23<sup>rd</sup>, 2013) – Two hundred schools and districts across the country were recognized for incorporating feedback from their students as they develop strategic plans, make budgeting decisions, enhance their curriculum and determine professional development needs. Project Tomorrow<sup>®</sup>, a national education nonprofit, announced this year's Speak Up 200, a collection of the top K-12 schools in the country that encourage and involve authentic student, parent and educator ideas and views in education planning and decision-making.

The schools were selected for this national distinction from the 35,000 schools nationwide that have participated in the annual Speak Up surveys, conducted by Project Tomorrow, since 2003. The Speak Up National Research Project collects K-12 student, parent and educator viewpoints on technology, 21<sup>st</sup> century education and student aspirations through an annual online survey process and shares that data with national, state and local policymakers to improve education for all children.

The schools selected for the 2012 Speak Up 200 represent a broad range of educational institutions in rural, suburban and urban communities.
